Operation Cleft started in September 2005 as a club project of the Rotary Club of Box Hill Central. It was initiated after a presentation by Colin Macfarlane AM prompted the club to sponsor 60 cleft repair operations in Bangladesh. Colin went to Lamb hospital to observe the program and returned to show club members photographs of the children before and after surgery. The incredible difference in children like Lija, one of our very first patients (pictured just 1 month after surgery), had a profound effect on club members that they decided to develop.

After ten years Operation Cleft is still going strong. Most of our eight surgeons have been with us from the beginning and between them have completed more than 10,000 cleft repair operations. They are extremely proud of their achievements and of their association with Operation Cleft. They asked us to express their gratitude to all those who support this amazing project that enables them to utilise their professional skills to help underprivileged children in their country.

Whilst much economic progress has been made in Bangladesh over the past decade, it

remains a low-income country with substantial deprivation and poverty. More than 45 million people, almost one-third of the population, live below the poverty line with the majority of these being in rural areas.

A child born with a cleft lip or palate in rural Bangladesh is very unlikely to have the surgery they need unless it is free and in a local hospital reasonably close to their village.

Our plastic surgeons travel extensively to offer their surgical skills at rural hospitals. This enables them to provide a service to local communities which, in the past, was only available to families who live in major cities like Dhaka, Chittagong, Jessore or Sylhet.

No child should have to suffer the humiliation and health issues associated with an untreated cleft regardless of where they live or their socio economic status.

To achieve the best results, our experts recommend that surgical repair of a cleft lip should ideally occur at around 3 months of age. If the patient also has a cleft palate, a second operation would be scheduled at around 9 months.

Completing the surgical repairs at this early age, allows the child's speech patterns to develop normally. They will also be spared many of the health issues that a cleft lip and palate can cause and will not be discouraged from attending school as they would have been if the condition remained untreated.

Whilst our surgeons operate on any person regardless of their age, over the years our focus has shifted to ensure that pre-natal education and cleft care information is widely available to promote the benefits of early intervention.

It is very encouraging to see that the majority of our patients are now under 2 years of age. Whilst many require more than one operation the repairs will be completed long before they reach school age. In a developing nation like Bangladesh, education is the catalyst to improved employment opportunities that ultimately will contribute to breaking the poverty cycle.

Operation Cleft - not just a pretty face

Dispelling the myths

People frequently ask why so many of our young patients have the same black birth mark on their forehead. Well it is actually not a birth mark.

It is known as a bindi and is painted on by the parents.

Many cultures in South East Asian countries believe that people have a "third eye" which sees spiritual truths. This third eye is located on the forehead above and between the eyes. A bindi is drawn on with paint made from ash. Sometimes turmeric and lime are added to colour the ash red. Bindis are traditionally worn over the third eye by Hindu women to show their marital





status. Young, unmarried women wear a black bindi and married women wear a bright red one.

Bindis are also believed to protect the wearer and make them strong. Many Bangladeshi mothers paint a black bindi on their child's forehead when they are sick or before they go into surgery. They believe that this will keep them safe and protect them from evil spirits.

Across the sea to Ireland

After ten years and 10,000 smiles, Operation Cleft has become much more than a small club project. It has grown into a widely known and well respected Rotary project that is supported by many thousands of Rotarians, clubs, businesses and individuals from all parts of Australia and the world.

Recently, our friends from the Rotary Club of Strabane Lifford in Ireland applied to their Rotary District, 1160 for a district grant to match funds that the club had raised to help children born with a cleft lip and/or palate in Bangladesh.

The grant, if approved, would contribute to funding the life changing cleft repair surgery that the children needed.

The Club's interest was piqued by member Bill McCauley who had seen stark images of young children with untreated clefts in a magazine. The difference that surgery could make to them and ultimately to their families motivated members to work hard to raise funds to help these children. Rotarian John McCosker took on the task of seeking a District grant which, if successful would double the amount of money the club had raised and subsequently the number of children that could be helped.



The grant was approved on the condition that implementation of the project was administered by a Rotary Club. John set about finding a club which met this criteria and after seeing Operation Cleft on the internet, contacted the General Manager. Club members were excited by the prospect of an Australian/Irish partnership and delighted when they discovered that the President of the Rotary Club of Box Hill Central (at the time), Don Sweeney, was formally from Glenties in County Donegal.

Is it the luck of the Irish that these passionate Rotarians found Operation Cleft or a testament to the incredible capacity of Rotary to make a real difference in the world? We believe it is both.



Thakurgaon Bangladesh. While some mothers were relieved and overjoyed that the operation was over, others waited anxiously for staff to call their baby in for surgery.

Thirty children had their cleft repaired at Prime Hospital, Thakurgaon and another twenty are scheduled to have surgery at Rangpur at the end of November. The President and members of the Rotary Club of Strabane Lifford are all very proud to see the results of their hard work. They are optimistic that news about the project will spread and encourage others in their local community to join them in changing the lives of underprivileged children born with a cleft lip and/or palate in Bangladesh. This partnership between two Rotary clubs on opposite sides of the world is a wonderful achievement and we would like to say a big thank you to all those involved in making it happen.

Fact

A cleft lip and/or cleft palate is the most common birth defect in the world. On average, 1 in every 500-750 babies will be born with this condition. In developed countries, the surgical repair is done soon after birth with the cost covered under a public health scheme. 5,000 - 6,000 babies are born with a cleft each year in Bangladesh. Because the condition is not considered life threatening, surgical repair is not covered under their overburdened public health system.
